mentors by giving webmasters encouragement and friendly constructive criticism on what they are doing right and where they could improve.

The Webmaster Contest also has its own logo! Ron Gibbs, editor and webmaster for the Charlotte Gem & Mineral Club of Charlotte, North Carolina, is also a graphic artiste extraordinaire. Ron donated his time and expertise to design and develop our logo. Thank you to Marty Hart for steering me to Ron.

I've received e-mails telling me that the judging info and guidelines published for the contest have already helped some webmasters to improve their sites.

Dan Alfrey, webmaster of Lake George Gem & Mineral Club, Lake George, Colorado wrote: *"We've had a lot of fun with our site. This contest truly has motivated our club to update our site and make sure everything is fully functional! We sincerely appreciate the guidelines and scoring references in order to help make the site more informative and complete!"*

Bob Loeffler, webmaster of North Jeffco Gem & Mineral Club, Arvada, Colorado wrote: *"I think this contest is a great idea because it might help push clubs to create a Web site (if they haven't already done so) or keep their existing Web site updated with fun and relevant info to help educate the public."*

All entries submitted to this brand new contest from the various regional federations are now in the hands of their assigned judges. Each region has two judges, but none of the judges are from the regions they are judging. Each contestant's combined scores from the two judges will be averaged to determine his or her final placement in their region.

RMFMS Treasurer Report March 2009

It is still winter here in Kansas as I write this article on Jan. 29, but the weather forecast is for a warming trend, and, besides, Peggy and I are headed for New Mexico and Arizona bright and early tomorrow morning. Rocks watch out, here we come.

On the treasurer subject, I am finally winding down the most frustrating part of the job as treasurer; getting the last 21 clubs to send in their reports, dues and insurance (if they want it). You would be surprised at how many of the late reporting clubs also depend on the RMFMS club liability insurance, and seem to have no awareness that it expires on Feb. 1 if we have not received their payment. I also have to pay our AFMS dues by Feb. 1 and need an accurate membership count in order to calculate the payment. Two clubs have still not reported, so I will just have to use last year's membership count for them.

The problem of late reporting seems to be twofold. Many clubs elect officers in December or January, and do not want to report until the new officers take over. If elections were held in November or December for January installation, then these clubs could report on time. The old treasurer often does not tell the new treasurer about the need for reporting, dues and insurance, and then ignores my notices that are sent out in October, December and January. Then I start telephoning, often multiple times, to find one member of a club that knows who is in charge. If only the retiring officer would tell the new officer about their responsibilities, life would sure be a lot easier for me.

Are you a retiring club treasurer? Did you tell your new treasurer about RMFMS reporting? Did you or the new treasurer notify me of the change so that I can update my mailing list? If not, please do.

Next month I will have a report on the number of clubs reporting and membership numbers. It looks like we are in the process of losing two clubs, Santa Fe and Custer City (SD). They both report that they are currently inactive.

TELLING THE STORY OF A ROCK
(Excerpted from Susan M. Frack's article on the NESEN web site, Univ. of Nebraska-Lincoln. Used by permission))

Telling the story of a rock can be very informational as well as entertaining, but sometimes writers need a little nudge or a framework to follow just to get started. Whether your writer is an adult or a junior, he should **do some research first!** The library and the Internet are good starting places, especially the kids' areas. In particular, telling the story of a rock calls for a look at the "rock cycle."

Important words to understand are igneous, sedimentary, and metamorphic (the types of rocks). In writing the story of a rock, tell what happens to the rock as it changes from one type to another, how the rock feels as it changes, what happens to its temperature, how close together its atoms and molecules are, etc. Be creative!

The story can be in one of many different forms:

- narrative with flashbacks
- mystery
- autobiography
- radio or television interview
- song
- poem
- cartoon
- TV show
- illustrated story

- comedy
- recipe
- directions for recycling
- vacationing or taking a trip

After researching and deciding what type of story to write on which rock (or gemstone), a writer can use the following outline to help compose his story:

I. Igneous Rocks

You start as magma. Are you on the surface (lava), near the surface, or deep beneath it?

- a. Cooling – fast or slow?
- b. Large or small crystal size or no crystals?
- c. Any gases trapped inside you?
- d. What is your overall appearance?

II. Sedimentary Rocks

You are being beaten into smaller pieces and carried away.

- a. What are these pieces called?
- b. What is causing the breakdown?
- c. What is carrying you away?
- d. Where are you going?
- e. Where do you end up?
- f. You are surrounded by other rock fragments. Are all of you the same size and type?
- g. Are more rock fragments piling above you?
- h. You are now sedimentary rocks. What changed you into a sedimentary rock? What is your overall appearance now? How are you different from an igneous rock?

III. Metamorphic Rocks

What must occur to change you into a metamorphic rock?

- a. What factors are involved?
- b. Where will this change occur?
- c. How do you get there?
- d. What do you look like now?
- e. Foliated or non-foliated?
- f. Crystalline or non-crystalline?
- g. Describe how you are different from igneous and sedimentary rocks.

IV. What might happen next?

When the writer has finished his story, he needs to come up with a great title – something that grabs a reader's attention and makes him want to read the whole story. To create a title, it helps to read the story. How does it "speak" to you? Of course, a writer can always come up with the title first and build the story around the title!

Most ideas and all of the outline above come from Susan M. Frack. Following her outline and suggestions will help prevent plagiarism (copying word for word without giving credit is a BIG no-no!). Her outline also gives an author something to "hang his words on."

No trophies will be awarded at the regional level. The original plan was to award a trophy to the first place winner in each regional federation. I just learned that the regional federations have not had an opportunity to vote on whether they support the Webmaster Contest, so no regional first place plaques can be awarded this year. However, we will be awarding certificates for each of the top ten places and for honorable mention. I apologize to to everyone who is

disappointed about this, but the contest will be running for at least two more years, so maybe the policy can be changed going forward.

So there will not be a plaque awarded to the first place regional federation winners, but I think they will receive something far better than a plaque. The first place winners will each have their entries forwarded to Bob Keller, the man who is judging at the AFMS level.

Bob is the first rockhound webmaster to have a presence on the World Wide Web—the Internet. Bob put the first rock shop up on the Internet in March 1995, and he called it Bob's Rock Shop. It began as a home page with eight or so images of rocks from his own collection. It is still called Bob's Rock Shop and is still at www.rockhounds.com, but it is now far more than that.

Bob will give the regional first place winners the benefit of his wisdom, his extensive Web experience, and his knowledge of what works and what doesn't. He will analyze each of the sites forwarded to him, and he will give useful feedback on what is being done well and how each site can be improved. Thank you, Bob, for agreeing to participate in our contest, for giving our first place regional winners the benefit of your hard-won wisdom as the world's premier rockhound webmaster, and for helping us achieve our goal of having rock and gem club Web sites that are as good as they can be.

All the contestants at the AFMS level will receive a certificate signifying their rank, and the first place winner will also receive an AFMS first place plaque.

The results of the various regional Webmaster Contests will be announced at the annual meetings of the regional federations during their Bulletin Editors' Breakfast. The results of the AFMS Webmaster Contest will be announced at the NFMS/AFMS joint Show & Convention in Billings, Montana on August 1 during the Bulletin Editors' Breakfast.

For instance, an etched vase valued at \$200 will be one of the items this year. As Dee explains in his letter, the structure this year will ensure that each regional federation has at least one winner.

This is a major way to financially support the American Federation's efforts on behalf of our hobby. Last year over \$8,000 was raised and a large number of prizes were given away. Dee requests that money be sent to the regional chairs. My contact information is printed below.

This year I won't be able to sell tickets at our RMFMS Show since it will be held after the AFMS Show in Billings, Montana. I hope a number of you will participate and hopefully be winners in Billings (you don't need to be present to win).

I'd like to explain how this year's Endowment Fund Drawing will be done. It's different than in the past because each regional committee member will hold the tickets they sell until just before the AFMS Convention/Show in Billings, Montana held July 28-Aug. 2, 2009. They will either bring their tickets or send them to me if they are not attending the show. We will draw the tickets at the show on Saturday.
