Update on Arizona West Coast Area

LAKE HAVASU CITY, AZ: Rockhounds and other patrons of federal Public Lands along the Lower Colorado River received notice in July, that the Resource Management Plan for the Lake Havasu Field Office of the federal Bureau of Land Management had been approved by state and federal BLM offices and will be in effect for the next 15 years. The RMP writing process for this region had been ongoing for the past five years, with major input from public interest groups on the ground here.

The Lake Havasu Field Office of the Arizona State BLM covers some three million acres centered on Lake Havasu, along the Lower Colorado River, including parts of California adjacent to the river. The LHFO was formed several years ago from portions of the Needles, CA., and the Yuma and Kingman, AZ, service areas of BLM. Its old RMP consisted of programs from 1982 for those offices. The update recognizes the tremendous population growth of the area and its attendant user influx thru this undeveloped desert, riverine and mountain area that, until 1970, contained only abandoned mines, small ranches and old ghost towns. The economic impact on the newer communities in the area was estimated at \$20,000,000 per year due solely to recreational users of these public lands, by the Arizona State Parks Agency.

The 2007 RMP for the LHFO was a conservative change from the former status, with few new user restrictions (none for mineral collectors), although some inclusive wilderness areas were enhanced slightly. Of major importance, however, was the official "mapping" of Off Highway roads and trails, some of which had existed since 1860 but few of which had ever been officially recognized by federal and state road authorities. Much of the field work, done by using GPS instruments and programs, was accomplished by volunteers from the public who turned over their mapping data to BLM for codification. Their maps were accepted into the new RMP as part of the Travel Management section, and will be the basis for any future modification. The first public input review will start next fall on the roadways around the Bullhead City-Laughlin area, as part of a continual review of the RMP by BLM.

Earlier this summer, the Arizona State BLM announced another reorganization of its offices in the area, creating the new "Colorado River District" from the former Lake Havasu and Yuma Field Offices. The new District Offices are located at Lake Havasu. However, each Field Office, here and elsewhere, will create and manage its own updated Resource Management Plan for its territory. The Yuma and Kingman Field Offices are currently in the initial phases of their RMP deliberations.

QUICK TIPS for EDITORS

Contest Time is Coming – What Are Judges Looking for in Articles?

Judging for articles published in club bulletins is based on four areas: style and language, article quality, author's effort, and educational/entertainment value.

Style and language. Articles need a catchy and/or appropriate title and should give the author's name. Judges look for writing that is interesting to read, easy to understand, and grammatically correct. (Using spell check, grammar check, and a live proofreader can help!) Accuracy is also important. Editors should cut any irrelevancies before they publish an article. These items account for 25 points of the scores awarded.

Quality is judged according to what type of article was written. Informational articles include how-to, hints, lapidary, historical, etc. Science articles include mineralogy, geology, paleontology, etc. Articles about collecting areas should be about the collecting sites, what specimens are found there, why an area is being closed, etc., and shouldnot be a travelogue. Club activities/members interest articles can include editorials, shows, civic-community-school activities, etc. Humorous articles must relate to the rockhounding hobby, but can be "fun." Judges decide into which of these categories an article fits and award a maximum of 20 points for what they consider "quality."

Author's effort means the author must demonstrate correct facts, adequately cover the subject, credit quotes and illustrations, give references for technical matters, and have no copyright violations. Before a judge rates these items he decides whether the author had to do research to write the article or based the article on personal experience or supplemented his personal experience with research. This portion of the judging is worth 35 points.

The **educational and/or entertainment value** of the article can earn up to 20 points. Judges will ask themselves if reading the article teaches something about the hobby or if the article makes the reader laugh.

Obviously, some of the judging has to be subjective. However, most judges are folks who have been authors and/or editors themselves, and they all use the same framework (judging sheets) when they judge. These judges are very qualified to do the job.

Editors can "practice" being a judge themselves by choosing their favorite articles from what they've published, then using the "sample judging sheets" that were included with the contest materials. They can also download these sheets from the RMFMS website at www.rmfms.org.

This article was written by using the AFMS judging sheets (same as RMFMS judging sheets) and was also based on the personal experience of the author.

For the time being, patrons of the federally managed public lands in this area, are pleased that their efforts in working with the BLM professionals resulted in a positive result for all concerned. There was only one publicly registered complaint against the proposal, from a non-profit environmentalist group from California who requested more areas to be designated as Wilderness and many fewer off-highway trails recognized by BLM. Most of their requests were denied as not serving in the larger public interest at this time.

Attention All Non-Profit Clubs

I saw an item in the metro newspaper that IRS is changing the regulations on annual financial reporting from non-profit corporations/organizations. Currently such educational and charitable groups must net more than \$25,000 in income/year to require filing of a ('990') report with IRS. The new regs, to go into effect this fall, lower that income figure to \$5,000; however, only a simple "post-card" report will be required whatever that means. Do many of our federation clubs fall into that "non-profit" status (with a state non-profit charter?) Ours does, but quite often our then current Secretary has "forgotten" or didn't know to file the required state report (not a financial report) and we then had to make a late filing to retain our state charter, with all the attendant red-tape and bureaucratic nonsense.

Polishing Chalcedony Roses

My wife and I had collected a lot of small chalcedony roses at the foot of the Cady Mountains. They were wind-polished, but that was all; I thought I would try an experiment. I put them into the ½ gallon Lortone tumbler, with tin oxide and very little water. I let them go for two weeks picking the thing up occasionally and shaking it to see if the stones were still moving, thinking to add water if they stopped, but they never did

After two weeks of polishing without grinding. I took them out – my test piece looked good, so I washed them all. After drying, they were the most incredibly beautiful chalcedony roses I have ever seen! I think the old-fashioned ways are sometimes the best, and the polish without grinding is the neatest trick I ever came up with! Try this and you might like the results.

Texas Garnets

There are garnets in Texas, but they are, so far that is known, only almandite. Locations are Llano, Blanco, Burnet, and Gillespie Counties. Gem quality garnets have been found in all these counties although most are small, less than 1/8 inch, although some have been found that are greater than ¼ inch. They are found mostly in stream beds where they have weathered out of the packsaddle schist found in these locals.

The preponderance of these garnets are badly included or too fractured to be of Gem quality; however, some flawless stones are encountered. The search for garnets in stream beds should be done much as the search for topaz or gold, due to their high specific gravity (3.9-4.2). Amandite is also known as Carbuncle and is an iron-aluminum garnet.
